More Affordable Than You May Think

The University of La Verne offers competitive merit scholarships to all qualified undergraduate applicants. There is no separate application process. All applicants are considered upon review of a completed and timely submitted application.

Financial Aid

Types of Aid Available

Merit scholarships are based on the student's GPA at admission, and can be enhanced by submission of SAT or ACT scores. Need-based aid is determined by the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or California Dream Act; such aid includes institutional need-based grants, the Federal Pell Grant, Cal Grant, Federal Work-Study, and loans.

Grants: Grants are need-based awards that do not need to be repaid as long as the student maintains eligibility.

Federal Work-Study: Work-Study is a paid work opportunity for students with financial need, allowing them to earn money to pay for educational expenses.

Loans: Unlike grants and scholarships, loans must be repaid.

Applying for Financial Aid

All applicants seeking need-based financial aid must file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at **studentaid.gov.**

If you are a Dreamer in California, be sure to submit the California Dream Act Application at **dream.csac.ca.gov** by March 2.

- → October 1 is the opening day to begin filing the FAFSA – La Verne's FAFSA code: 001216.
- → California residents should also make sure their high school submits the GPA Verification Form for them by March 2.

Application for Admission

☐ Visit **univ.lv/application** to apply.

Application Fee

☐ Submit a \$50 application fee. For eligible students, we accept NACAC or College Board fee waivers. Please see your high school counselor for details.

Personal Statement

 \square Tell us something about yourself. Make sure to proofread! The word count for the essay is 250 words minimum.

Transcripts

☐ Submit your transcripts to the Office of Admission. We will accept unofficial transcripts in PDF for admission consideration, but we will need final official transcripts directly from your school once you graduate.

Letter of Recommendation

☐ Have a teacher, academic counselor, supervisor, etc. write us a letter about your work ethic and character. You can upload your letter or send an invitation directly to your recommender through the application portal.

Official Test Scores (Optional)

- ☐ The University of La Verne is test optional, which means SAT or ACT scores are not required for admission. However, you may submit SAT or ACT test scores if you believe it makes your application stronger.
- ☐ The La Verne identification code for the SAT is **4381**.
- ☐ The La Verne identification code for the ACT is **0295**.

Please note: Test scores may be submitted as part of the transcript.
