COURSE DESCRIPTION

This three-credit course provides an introduction to the history of the United States from the end of Reconstruction (ca. 1877).

Breakdown of Assignments:

Please note: this course is broken up into "units." This means that all of your deadlines will be on a per unit basis—due by the end of the final week of the respective unit. The only exception to this will be the midterm exam, which I will give you an additional week to complete (see below, under "Midterm Exam"). Nevertheless, understand that most of your assignments are assigned on a chapter by chapter basis, within the timeframe of the respective unit. The reason for this style of organization is to allow you work, to some extent, at your own pace. But, the flip side of this is that you must assume personal responsibility for getting all of your chapter assignments done in a timely manner—before the end of the respective unit. In other words, do not put off all of your chapter by chapter work for the respective unit until the end of that unit. If you are confused about this, see the Course Schedule below.

- **1. Chapter Quizzes (12 x 1.5% = 18%).** As an online history course, your textbook is your primary instrument of instruction. Accordingly, each unit you will take multiple-choice quizzes on the various assigned chapter readings for that unit (see the Course Schedule below). Each quiz can be taken an unlimited number of times prior to the deadline for its respective unit. Your final completed attempt will be your final grade for that particular quiz. There will be twelve Chapter Quizzes in total. Each quiz will count toward 1.5% of your final grade.
- **2. Chapter Response Questions (11 x 2% = 22%).** Each unit (except the last) you will compose written responses addressing specific questions relating to the textbook chapters assigned for that unit (see the Course Schedule below). Your answers to these chapter "response questions" will be submitted as "peer review" assignments and will be reviewed by two of your peers in the **subsequent** unit. Again, if all of this sounds confusing, stay tuned: follow the directions on Blackboard (and see the Course Schedule below). In any case, if you should feel that, for any given chapter's work, your own score, given by one your peers, is inordinately low, simply complete and submit to me by email the appeal form (provided on Blackboard under the "Need Help?" tab), and I will personally re-assess that particular score. Rest assured, you will not receive a lower grade than that originally assigned by your peers. There will be eleven Chapter Response Questions assignments in total. Each Chapter Response Questions assignment will count toward 2% of your final grade.
- **3. Peer Review Performance (4 x 2% = 8%).** In Units 2-5, you will "peer review" the Response Questions submitted by two of your peers **for all the various chapters** from the **previous** unit (see Course Schedule). Blackboard will automatically assign you two students for each chapter to peer review. Your reviews will be graded on whether or not you provide **effective** feedback to your peers (according to the guidelines provided on Blackboard). Your grade for this component of the course will be pass/fail. Again, I know this may sound confusing. Please follow along on Blackboard for this. In any case, for each appropriate unit (Units 2-5), your own successful completion of this "peer review" will count towards 2% of your final grade.
- **4. History "Conversations" (4 x 2% = 8%).** In Units 1-4, you will contribute thoughtful, substantive posts on various topics. Follow the prompts on Blackboard for specific instructions: prompts will be provided within each of the units. The goal is that over the course of each unit, the class will develop an extended "conversation" around the given topics. Each unit, you should contribute to the topic most interesting to you. In other words, you do not have to contribute to every topic. But you are required to contribute five posts in total for each unit, including at least one post per chapter week. These informal conversations will count toward 2% of your final grade per unit.
- **5. Essay (1 x 10%).** At the end of the term (see Course Schedule), you will be responsible for preparing a formal typed (computer-generated) essay (**minimum of four** *full* **pages**) in response to specific

questions and instructions provided on Blackboard. This formal essay must be double-spaced, in twelve-point font, Times New Roman, with one-inch margins. Suffice it to note here that this essay will be assessed as much on the basis of style and formatting (including grammar) as content. This formal essay will count toward 10% of your final grade.

- **6. Midterm Exam (1 x 16% = 16%).** There will be a mid-term exam available on the Friday of Week 5 through the end of Week 6. The midterm will only cover material from the first two units (Weeks 1-5) (see Course Schedule). This exam will consist of three parts: thirty multiple choice questions; four short essays (IDs); and one long essay question. The mid-term exam will count toward 16% of your final grade.
- 7. Final Exam (1 x 16% = 16%). The nature and conditions of the final exam will mirror the mid-term—it will not be cumulative. In other words, it will only assess material covered during the final three units (Weeks 6-10). The final exam will be available on the Monday of Unit 5 (Week 10) through the end of that unit/week. The final exam will count toward 16% of your final grade.
