Course Description

This course is an introduction to the theory and practice of interpersonal communication. Interpersonal communication refers to the social and emotional aspects of messages, the effects and impressions they create, and the barriers to understanding that they raise or remove. Throughout the course we will explore a number of current topics in the field of interpersonal communication, with particular emphasis on the processes that govern personal relationships. Besides studying theory and research, this course emphasizes actively practicing and writing about interpersonal communication skills.

Course Goals

- A To introduce basic theory and research in interpersonal communication.
- B To help students understand their implicit (personal) theory of interpersonal communication and how it affects their communication.
- C To provide the opportunity for students to improve their communication through skill exercises in activities or journals exercises that address interpersonal communication skills.

Course Requirements

BLACKBOARD: You are required to check Blackboard frequently. Blackboard is an important resource for you as is contains an updated course calendar with dates for the exams, papers, and our journal assignments. You will be held accountable for knowing the information on this site, which includes changes to the syllabus, calendar, and e-mail announcements.

ATTENDANCE and ABSENCES: In an online class, I don't take daily attendance, but you are responsible for keeping up with class participation. It is important that you read and study the week-by-week power point slides as well as listen to my lecture embedded as audio links in the power point slides. Many exam questions come from the audio power point lectures, meaning that reading the book alone will not be enough to do well on the exams. In fact, the audio power point slides are one of your most important study tools for exams

DUE DATES: Exam dates, paper due dates, and journal assignments are listed in the syllabus. If you do not complete an assignment by the due date, you receive "0" points. The ONLY exception to this policy is a situation that **I determine** to be an emergency, in which case you should contact me **as soon as possible.** The situations I deem to be emergencies are serious, compelling, and <u>verifiable</u> situations (such as an acute medical emergency) that can be demonstrated, and the student has made every reasonable effort to contact the instructor beforehand. Make-up work will <u>not</u> be allowed for reasons such as car trouble, work scheduling conflicts, family or relationship crises, or non-school related travel plans. All assignments will be announced sufficiently in advance to allow for thorough preparation and timely completion. All assignments should be submitted on Blackboard, on or before their scheduled due dates.

If any kind of problem arises for you, whether it is illness, school travel, or even any problem you experience in the class, please talk to me. I can help you understand your options better the earlier you talk to me. EXAMS AND PAPERS: There will be two exams, each worth 50 points (100 points total for exams), and one paper worth 52 points. The paper asks you to reflect on the use of various communication skills in romantic relationships (either one of your own or one you have observed). Exams and papers will be based on the material covered in lecture and the book. Exams will not be cumulative. You will receive detailed requirements for the paper in the latter half of the semester.

JOURNAL ASSIGNMENTS: As listed in the syllabus, you will complete 6 journal assignments. Journal assignments are worth 8 points. Journal assignments are always due before Fridays at 12:00 p.m. (noon), although there is not one due every week. Check the syllabus for dates.
