Sexual assault only happens between strangers.

Most survivors know the person who harmed them. Often a friend, partner, classmate, or acquaintance.

If they didn't say no, it's not assault.

Consent must be clear, enthusiastic, and ongoing. Silence, fear, or being under the influence does not equal consent.

If they were drinking, they are partly to blame.

Being under the influence does not make someone responsible for being assaulted. Responsibility lies with the person who chooses to cause harm.

It's not assault if it happened within a relationship.

Sexual assault can happen in any relationship. Consent is required every time, and is ongoing no matter your relationship status.

They were wearing revealing clothing, that means they were asking for it.

No one ever asks to be assaulted. Clothing, behavior, or flirting never justifies violence.
